



CABEI contributes to the wellbeing of Central Americans by strengthening health systems



- Multiple infrastructure and hospital equipment initiatives, as well as research and donations, are being implemented in the region with CABEI support.

Investment in health is synonymous with development and competitiveness for countries, since their populations can safeguard their wellbeing through efficient and quality systems. This was even more evident in the last two years in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic, which represented a global and regional challenge.

For this reason, the Central American Bank for Economic Integration (CABEI) contributes to the efforts of its member countries to improve the quality of their health systems by financing investments in the

construction and expansion of hospitals and clinics, as well as providing technical assistance and donating medical equipment and supplies.

CABEI Executive President, Dante Mossi emphasized: "in the face of the global uncertainty brought about by the health crisis caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, we are very pleased to know that in all the countries of the region we are contributing in some way to the care of the sick, with quality infrastructure and equipment, in addition to donations to support the authorities in this titanic task."

Initiatives at a regional level

The actions supported by the multilateral in the region in the health sector are historic and continue to be relevant to safeguard the well-being of Central Americans.

For example, through the 2021 approvals, it is planned to build ten new hospitals, vaccinate more than 8.4 million people against COVID-19 by acquiring more than 16.8 million vaccines against the disease.



Guatemala

In Guatemala, the Hospital Infrastructure and Equipment Investment Program is being implemented to replace three hospitals in the hospital network that are at risk of collapse (Mazatenango, Jutiapa and Cobán) and to recover the installed capacity of the hospitals in Sololá and Chiquimula.

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Honduras was one of the countries requesting resources for the acquisition of vaccines against COVID-19 in 2021. With CABEI financing of US\$35.0 million, and in addition, it invested US\$14.9 million in hospital equipment for emergency health care in the country, as well as cooperation for up to US\$2.8 million to combat COVID-19 and US\$1.0 million to equip the labor and delivery unit of the Danlí and Comayagua hospitals.

Nicaragua

In Nicaragua, CABEI benefits more than six million Nicaraguans with the execution of five projects aimed at the health sector with a total financing of US\$331.6 million, including the implementation of the Vaccination Deployment Plan and COVID-19 care, as well as the construction and equipping of hospitals for pandemic care.

Also, the Chinandega Departmental Hospital was built with an area of 34,895.6 square meters where more than 500,000 people from the western part of the country and distant areas will be attended in a timely manner. In addition, the replacement of the Nuevo Amanecer Regional Hospital of the North Atlantic Autonomous Region (RAAN) is progressing.

In previous years, it financed the construction of the General Occidental de Managua Dr. Fernando Vélez Paiz Hospital and the Dr. Alejandro Dávila Bolaños Military Hospital, both of which are now in operation and have had a positive impact on 1,350,000 people.

Costa Rica

Costa Rica has had CABEI support in the health sector for more than two decades, with investments in specialized care centers and most hospitals. In addition, in 2020 it received several donations to support the emergency caused by COVID-19.

Currently, a program is being implemented with an impact on three hospitals, as well as a loan for refinancing the purchase of vaccines; and approval from the authorities is also awaited, for the implementation of another program with an impact on three other hospitals.

Dominican Republic

In the Dominican Republic, according to the Rosa Emilia Sánchez Pérez de Tavarez National Cancer Institute (INCART), only 67% of cases of cancer in minors are detected in the initial phase, which is why CABEI is participating with an important donation that will enable INCART to have specialized equipment to carry out this work in a timely manner. In addition, CABEI was present to support with economic and in-kind donations during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The initiatives in the area of health are in line with the Central American Bank for Economic Integration (CABEI) 2020-2024 Institutional Strategy and promote the human development and social inclusion strategic axes and, in addition, support the fulfillment of Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) number 3 "health and welfare" of the 2030 Agenda.

The well-being of our staff

Health is also a priority issue within CABEI, for which it has a Social Benefits Fund that, among other issues, is in charge of caring for the welfare of 727 people, including employees and retirees and their families, who during 2021 received medical attention through fairs held at the headquarters building and in the regional offices, including the application of 580 vaccines against influenza, 760 laboratory tests and more than 250 consultations with specialists, as well as medical talks and education sessions.

In a comprehensive approach to health, the Bank also provides spaces for exercise and recreation.

In the context of the COVID-19 pandemic, during 2021 the Bank organized 3 vaccination days at its Headquarters in Honduras, where more than 500 doses were applied to complete its vaccination schedule. It also created a program to finance expenses that might arise in the management of the vaccine (transportation and lodging), approving 55 loans for this purpose.

In addition, on a daily basis, employees are provided with protective equipment and rigorous safety protocols, ranging from cleaning, distancing and care of capacity, provision of masks, to periodic antigen or PCR tests, allowing us to control the spread of the virus internally, so that the Bank can continue to operate and fulfill its role of support for the economic reactivation of our region.
